



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

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MODEL T FORD CLUB OF GREATER ST. LOUIS FRIDAY, MAY 12, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Vice President Kent Gilbane, who announced that President Steven Williams had been detained and would arrive shortly. Members present were Vice President Kent Gilbane, Treasurer Bonnie Dattoli, Secretary Ruth Baker, and Directors Daniel Mullis, Paul Diebold, Keith Sanders, Steven Thum, Dave Groerich and Stephen Heatherly. Also in attendance were Jenny Sanders, Nick Dattoli, Suzanne Pourcillie, Dave Kuenzel, Ken Baker and Diana Thum. President Steven Williams and Sherry Williams arrived.

Minutes of the April 14, 2023 Directors Meeting were read. Dave Groerich made the motion to approve the minutes; the motion was seconded by Paul Diebold and carried unanimously, with no objections.

Treasurer Bonnie Dattoli gave the treasurer's report, and stated that 79% of the budget has been spent to date. Daniel Mullis made the motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. The motion was seconded by Keith Sanders and carried unanimously.

Kent Gilbane reported on the Swap Meet held May 7. He stated that the striping project went well on Wednesday, and there was a good turnout of volunteers from Wheels of Motion. He mentioned that the gross income was down about \$7,000.00 from last year, and he's cutting 20% out of the Swap Meet budget. Ken Baker reported that this year there were a total of 144 vendors who rented 337 spaces; 36 of those vendors came in Saturday night and Sunday. He stated that there had been 218 vendors in 2022. Kent Gilbane stated that the vendor mailing list is going to be cut, he is going to eliminate security positions and vendor placement volunteers will convert to security. He said there will be four or five less carts rented.

He stated that the ballpark rental is \$4,500.00 for the next two years. He mentioned cutting back on food, cutting \$1,000.00 out of radio ads. He said he plans to bring back the "buy three, get one free" rentals for past vendors only, and to bring the spot sizes back to 17 feet by 18 feet next year. Steven Williams stated that there was a complaint that there was no coffee available at the ballpark; the consensus was that the Club would sell coffee and donuts next year.

Steven Williams stated that at the last meeting, the membership received a proposed amendment to the By-Laws. The final version was reviewed and will be presented to the general membership this evening for approval. The 2023-2024 budget was reviewed and updated. A motion was made by Steven Thum, seconded by Bonnie Dattoli to continue to donate \$250.00 to the Shriner's Hospital; motion carried. A motion was made by Kent Gilbane, seconded by Paul Diebold to approve the budget; motion carried.

There being no further business, at 7:55 p.m., Kent Gilbane made the motion to adjourn. The motion was seconded by Keith Sanders, and carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 7:55 p.m.

Treasurer Bonnie Dattoli gave the treasurer's report, and stated that 79% of the budget has been spent to date. Dave Kuenzel made the motion to approve the Treasurer's Report. The motion was seconded by Kent Gilbane, and carried unanimously.

Sam Atkinson reported that Karl Abe had open heart surgery; and is in rehab, progressing well. Steven read a thank you card from Joe Trewhella. Daniel Mullis reported that Sherry Dodson's memory is getting worse. Steven Thum reported that Sam Vitale is receiving experimental drugs for lung cancer

New members Tim Bollinger and Jack Bollinger were at the meeting. They own a 1926 Tudor coupe and a Model T Ton Truck, recently purchased. Ken Rothschild is going to be returning as a member.

Michael Thum reported that he is uploading the new Occasional to the website. Dave O'Malley reported that all videos are available. Don Spaeth stated that the library is available, and added that there are several books that have been checked out, but he has no record who has them. He asked that when someone checks out a book that they place their name on the card. Steven Williams stated that the deadline for the next Occasional is June 10.

Suzanne Pourcillie stated that the magnets have been ordered and when they arrive, members who ordered them may pay the Club \$19.00 each.

Sam Atkinson reported that the overnight tour will be July 8 and 9 to St. James. He talked about the route crossing the Gasconade River where there is no bridge. He asked that participating members make their room reservations and then let him know they are going. The group will be meeting in Eureka at the Walgreens and Quik Trip on Highway 109 south of Interstate 44 at 8:00 a.m. There will be winery visits, and a great dinner, with a return trip on the 9th via Highway 66.

Kent Gilbane reported on the Swap Meet, which he said was operated by 11 less people than last year. He said that thankfully nobody was injured, and there were no problems with security. He thanked the crew who striped on Wednesday. He said the gross income is down about 20%, so there will have to be some budget belt tightening. He is cutting back 15 - 20% on Swap Meet expenses. Steven Williams stated that since the gross income from the Swap Meet was below the threshold for workers to receive a portion off their banquet cost, this year, workers would not receive this benefit.

The Horseless Carriage Club Swap Meet will be in September in Chesterfield. The Pumpers and Pistons event will be on May 20 at the Museum of Transportation.

Steven Williams reviewed the Proposed Amendment to the By-Laws pertaining to the Code of Conduct, copies which he distributed to the membership. Sam Atkinson made the motion to approve the Proposed Amendment. The motion was seconded by Don Spaeth, and carried unanimously.

Steven Williams reviewed the 2023-2024 budget which has been approved by the Board. He said there is about a 20% cut across the board to have a balanced budget.

Dave Groerich stated that George Paugh's 1926 coupe did not sell at the Swap Meet. He said if the car is purchased by someone in St. Louis, the family has agreed to a price less than the \$14,000.00 being asked.

Steven Williams stated he will have a 1926 Tudor and a 1912 Torpedo for sale. Dave Sarniguet said he has trailer lights for anyone who needs them.

The 50/50 drawing was \$38.00 each, with both tickets held by Paul Diebold.

There being no further business, at 8:50 p.m., Don Spaeth made the motion to adjourn. The motion was seconded by Dave O'Malley, and carried unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 8:50 p.m.

CODE OF CONDUCT ADOPTED

At the May club meeting, a proposed amendment to our By-Laws was presented for the second reading, and was adopted by the club membership. This Code of Conduct appears as part of Section II of our By-Laws:

Article II

Section 11 - Code of Conduct

- A. The purpose of this club being the congenial enjoyment, display, repair, restoration, showing and touring of the Model T Ford automobile, all non-Model T personal business shall be kept out of club meetings. Private interactions not related to Model T's shall be kept private.
- B. The sale, exchange, or repair of Model T's and/or parts shall be done in an honest, professional, and ethical manner among Club members. The expectation is that fair market value or less shall be charged where money changes hands.
- C. Discussions at meetings shall be done in a respectful manner. No raised voices or intemperate remarks, including name-calling or insults will be tolerated.
- D. Behavior during public events (e.g. shows, demonstrations, tours, parades, swap meet, etc) that calls negative attention to the Club or is a public display of ill temper, anger, foul or obscene language will not be tolerated.
- E. (1) The policies, procedures, rules and regulations of organizations that sponsor public events (parades, car shows, etc.) shall be adhered to in every respect. Failure to do so will be considered a violation and dealt with according to sub-section G below.
- (2) The use of alcohol while driving on a club tour shall be prohibited. Such use is in violation of the law and may put the Club at risk in case of accident.
- F. Handling money. At any event in which money is handled by any member, such funds shall be turned in to the treasurer as soon as possible, or within 30 days, with a full accounting. Failure to do so shall constitute a violation and dealt with according to sub-section G below.
- G., Violations of the aforementioned subsections shall be discussed at the next Board meeting (or special called meeting) following the event in which the violation occurred. If the Board, by simple majority vote, determines a violation has occurred, depending upon the severity of the violation, one of the following shall apply: A) Censure; B) Censure with some sort of punishment determined by the Board; or C) said violator's membership in the Club shall be terminated immediately, and said person/s shall be permanently banned from the Club, irrespective of membership in the Model T Ford Club of America.
