

The Jun of Driving an Old Car: License and Insurance, Please





MINUTES OF THE MEMBERSHIP MEETING OF THE MODEL T FORD CLUB OF GREATER ST. LOUIS FRIDAY, JULY 12, 2024

It was announced that the club has recruited 2 new members, Larry Summers and Varon Fugman.





OCCASIONAL AND DUES CHANGES!

As previously reported, the more than 30 per cent decline in our Swap Meet income necessitates a change in our dues situation. These changes became effective July 1, 2024. If you are a member of the Model T Ford Club of America, effective July 1 your dues to our Club will be \$20.00. If you are NOT a member of the MTFCA, your local dues are \$35.00. However, if you've already paid local dues for this year, you will owe only \$10 July 1, and that will carry you over to July 1, 2025.

Because our insurance premiums are based on our membership levels, persons who have not paid their local dues by September 1, 2024, will be dropped from membership in the Model T Ford Club of Greater St. Louis, irrespective of their membership in the MTFCA.

Regarding the *Occasional*, for those of you who receive a "hard copy" by mail, it costs more to mail than it does to print. The Board has decided to no longer mail them out, but they will be at the club meeting following publication, with your name on your copy. IF, however, you prefer to continue having the publication mailed to you, effective August 1, it will cost you \$10 per year.
