

2024 Veteran's Day Parade





MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING OF THE MODEL T FORD CLUB OF GREATER ST. LOUIS FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:33 pm by President Steven Williams. Secretary Ruth Baker was not present due to her husband Ken receiving word that he might have pancreatic cancer, in addition to lung cancer. Ken will be having more tests.

The Treasurer's report was given by Bonnie Dattoli. Motion was made, seconded, and unanimously passed to accept the report.

Discussion then focused on our membership, and who has paid or not paid local club dues. 86 families are currently on the roster, for whom we pay insurance for our national coverage. Only 43 members have paid their local dues. Members need to be current on both local and national dues to be officers of our club. Paul Diebold due to his new work schedule will be going off the board the end of this year. It was confirmed that members who are delinquent on their local dues will be removed from our membership roll. This policy was announced in the last two *Occasionals*, and President Williams sent an email to all who are delinquent informing them of the need to get current or they would be dropped.

Thank you letters were received from the Model T Ford Museum for memorial donations in memory of Sherrie Dodson and Sam Vitale.

New Business: Our cost of floral arrangements has gone up. Sherry Williams has been taking care of this, and trying to use coupons to reduce the costs.

The club is allowed one free membership in the MTFCA each year as a means of encouraging people to join the national organization. The Board decided to award this membership to Bill Tabor for his years of work on behalf of the club, and his current program of receiving magazines from us and sending them to veteran's homes at his expense.

The Boy Scouts still have not cashed their Swap Meet check, just like last year. And they have requested a replacement check. Kent Gilbane moved, and Jerry Ellerbeck Jr. Seconded that our treasurer send them a replacement cashier's check and deduct the stop payment fee on the other check from this replacement check. Bonnie was the only no vote, motion passed.

Regarding Wheels in Motion workers at our swap meet, the decision was made to no longer use them as they are really not needed. That will save us \$750. Discussion ensued, and it was decided that President Williams will send a letter to that club to that effect.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.



Our Trip to Ranken

I am a Ranken graduate, class of 1984, from the auto body program. I am also fortunate that my instructor, Don Huster, who some of you know through other car club associations and I have stayed in touch and become life long friends. He has been a supporter of the school for years and found out that the current class is building a Model T to enter in The Great American Race 2025 X-Cup Division, a class for high school and tech school students that build cars inside their programs. He mentioned my involvement and membership in our club and the next thing I know, an invitation is in my inbox inviting me and any other members down to see their progress. We met on the last day of classes before he holiday break.

They are building a '26 2-door coupe. It was found locally, and Keith Sanders told us he had the opportunity to buy that car before. They are making some changes to the car to ensure that it will complete the race and also for safety concerns. They sourced a 60 horsepower flathead Ford V-8, a 1934 Ford rear axle, and a lowered front axle. To accommodate the drivetrain they extended the frame by 4 inches. They also added a bench seat from a modern car that incorporates lap and shoulder belts.

They are on a tight schedule and have 18 students working on it along with the normal class schedule. We were impressed with the enthusiasm and progress they are making. A concern for parts was presented to us, as they are having trouble sourcing a set of 1934 16 inch Ford spoke wheels for it. Luckily, I was able to find 5 wheels for them with one phone call and quite a bit cheaper than the other set that someone locally had for them, that stopped responding to their calls.

The Great Race will pass through Springfield, Illinois, at its closest to us. Sam Atkinson has a route that gets us there and I suggest we, as a club, parade our cars there to show our support.
